I wish to thank you for the clipping from the Daily Star. This was, evidently, placed in the paper by a man named [REDACTED], the father of one of our patients, who has, apparently, obtained [REDACTED] name from his daughter while visiting her here. This man is a farm labourer at Hawkestone, Ont., and it is quite apparent that he is defective mentally. He quite likely wishes to propose matrimony and make some arrangements with the mother to have [REDACTED] removed from the institution. I will, however, be able to deal with this situation when next he visits the hospital.

I may say that [REDACTED] father visited her yesterday. He also had noticed this clipping and he and his sister, Mrs. [REDACTED] who resides at [REDACTED] Mount Dennis, Ont., are anxious to take [REDACTED] out of the institution. The father stated that he would take legal proceedings, if necessary, to do this. I managed to persuade him not to take any immediate action with the promise that I would make arrangements to have the situation in his sister's home investigated. Would it, therefore, be too much trouble for you to let me have the history of this family situation and ascertain if the [REDACTED] family are in a position to give [REDACTED] the very careful and constant supervision necessary in her case?
